MAGS Lending Library Opening April 1, 1993, Join In!

The Mid-Atlantic Germanic Society was founded to stimulate and facilitate research on our German ancestors. MAGS founders wanted to create an organization which would provide help to German researchers. Among the many services envisioned was a lending library. That vision has through the hard work and dedication of volunteers become a reality. It is hoped that the lending library will compensate for the lack of local sources of German research information and facilitate German family research.

MAGS members have donated almost two hundred books and many more periodicals and newsletters. Several family histories and group sheets are on the shelves. You are invited to share in building the collection. **But**, more importantly, you are invited to borrow from the collection.

Here is how it works:

- You must be a member of MAGS in order to participate.
- Send \$2.00 (two dollars) for the "Book List." (Fee covers printing, handling, and return postage.)
- To join the program, send in a registration fee of \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars). This one-time

payment serves as a security bond to cover borrowed books not returned or damaged in transit.

■ **Loan Request:** A Library Loan Request Form is sent with the "Book List" and with each subsequent order. Borrowers list five titles in order of preference including the **correct and complete call numbers**, with, in the case of family histories, the publication date.

The first two titles available will be sent. The maximum loan is two books at any given time. Annual volumes of periodicals, bound or unbound, count as one book. When requesting a multi-volume work, specify which volume you want.

■ There is a charge of \$4.00 (four dollars) for postage, insurance, and handling. UPS Service is available at additional cost which must be included with the request.

■ **Delivery and use:** Allow three (3) weeks for processing your order and shipping. Additional time is required during holiday and vacation periods.

■ **Returning Books:** Books may be returned either by the U.S. Postal Service or United Parcel



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Fraktur Forum

No Stolzenbachs on Fraktur — Yet

Gene Roeder of Santa Monica, California, asked about the name Stolzenbach on fraktur of Northampton County, Pennsylvania. To date, we have not recorded any Stolzenbachs on fraktur, but we will continue to watch for Gene. Gene's family in Northampton County was connected with the Moravian Church and the closest possible relative we could find may be a Vogel, another name Gene mentioned. According to Gene, Johann Heinrich Stoltzenbach (1802-1865) married Anna Elisabeth Vogel (1805-1877).

Perhaps related to Anna Elisabeth Vogel, a Johannes Fogel and his wife Christina sponsored the baptism of Christina Michael in 1807 in Nazareth Township, Northampton County. Nazareth was a Moravian community although citizens of other faiths resided there, too.

According to this fraktur birth and baptism certificate, the Fogels sponsored a baptism for a Reformed family. Sponsors at baptisms were often related to the child. The pastor presiding at the baptism was Thomas Pomp. Christina Michael was the daughter of Johannes Michael and Elisabetha (Beck) Michael. She was born September 26, 1807, at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon and baptized in November of the same year. This certificate was made by fraktur artist Martin Brechall (d.1831) and appears in the May-June 1979 issue of *Colonial Homes*, page 76, No. 2.

We ask Gene to be patient. We have indexed thousands of names on fraktur and continue to index more as quickly as we can. Just because your ancestor's name has yet to appear on fraktur does not mean fraktur made for that family does not exist. It's just that accessibility to these

records has been all too limited for many years, a problem that is slowly but surely being overcome. Incidentally, Gene, your own surname Roeder does appear on fraktur in case you are interested.

Buchbesprechungen

Books which deal with German research, source records for the Mid-Atlantic area and books of general interest to the genealogical researcher will be reviewed in the order in which they are received. Ralph Beaver Strassburger and William John Hinke. *Pennsylvania German Pioneers: A Publication of the Original Lists of Arrivals in the Port of Philadelphia From 1727 to 1808*. 3 volumes. 864 pp.; 928 pp.; 768 pp., maps; illus.; acid-free paper; smythe-sewn; cloth; full-name index; \$182.00 postpaid for the full set or \$68.50 for Volume I, \$73.50 for Volume II, and \$63.50 for Volume III. Reprints come in two forms. The most common is the facsimile reprint; the most needed is the updated reprint where the publisher adds a complete index or additional information missing from the original or corrects mistakes in the original. In reprinting *Pennsylvania German Pioneers* Picton Press has chosen the latter course. A new introduction by Lewis Rohrbach outlines the corrections made in the original and provides information about current scholarship.

That this publication is the definitive study of early German immigrants is apparent when one learns that in the five decades since its original publication "no more lists of the immigrants themselves have surfaced." As the introduction notes, there will always be differences of opinion in the interpretation of the signatures themselves; however, in this publication one is allowed to decide for one's self. The signatures are included in Volume II. Volume I contains an introduction which provides the historical background of the lists and the lists for the period 1727-1775. Volume II contains the original signatures and marks for the period 1727-1808 and Volume III contains the lists for 1785-1808 and the indexes. In these three volumes one finds the names of over 30,000 German males who entered through the port of Philadelphia between 1727 and 1775. This is almost half of the estimated 65,000 Germans who arrived in Pennsylvania during that period. Strassberger and Hinke are an essential source for German immigration researchers and Picton Press presents it in the durable format such a resource deserves.

Dilts, Bryan Lee. *1890 Virginia Census Index of Civil War Veterans or Their Widows*, 1986; xxxvi, 32 pp.; \$19.00 + \$3.00 postage. Order from **Historic Resources, Inc., PO Box 329, Bountiful, UT 84011**.

The 1890 special schedule of surviving soldiers, sailors, marines and their widows was intended to be for Union veterans and spouses. However, just as some were omitted for whatever reason, some were listed who were Confederate not Union veterans. All names including those noted on the lists as Confederate and those marked out that were still readable have been listed. Surname, given name(s), county, locale, supervisor's district and enumerator's district are provided. With this information the user can go to the original entry on microfilm. The data found on the microfilm will include the house and family number from the 1890 population schedule (destroyed); names of surviving soldiers, sailors, marines, and widows, rank, company, name of regiment or vessel, date of enlistment, date of discharge, length of service, postoffice address, disability incurred and remarks. This is the place to start for anyone researching a Civil War ancestor.

During the Revolutionary War thousands of certificates were issued by quartermasters and provisioners to civilians whose beef, guns, fodder, horses, wagons and other necessities were requisitioned. These certificates were then presented at special county courts where payment was authorized. While individual references can be found scattered throughout county order and minute books, the major source is found in individual county Publick Claims booklets sent to the state auditor's office. A total of 70 county booklets, one for each county except the (continued on page 42)

newly formed Kentucky counties, survive and provide an interesting insight into the lives of our forebearers. For example, in Culpeper we find Mary Sampson providing 275 lb. beef, 10 diets and 2 bushels of corn, John Rodeheifer 61 days of wagggonage, Adam Yager, Sr. 14 bu. corn, 200 days pasturage and 27 diats, John Flint 1 wagggon about half worn and 1 horse 5 years and Christopher Crigler 9 gal. brandy. These booklets are especially valuable to those researchers of "burned" counties and the tracers of elusive females, a number of whom can be found presenting their claims in these volumes.

Occasionally a researcher unearths a unique collection of records in a private collection which provides data unavailable from other sources. Such are the tax assessments found here. In 1813 Congress passed an act for the assessment of direct and internal duties. The first district, one of twenty-six in Virginia included the counties listed above. Some 1600 of the individual tax assessments have survived and are transcribed. The following is an example taken from the Wythe County list:

Jacob Fisher, one farm on the waters of Cripple Creek, 104½ acres having thereon one dwelling house of wood, 1½ stories, 20 feet by 17 feet, one kitchen, both cabben roof, one smoke house, two stables, one corn crib, one loom house, one double geard grist mill, valued at \$850, Signed in German script.

Following the publication of the first book, over 400 additional tickets: 388 for Washington County, 1 for Lee and 24 for Wythe, were found and are presented here.

Between 1877 and 1934 the *Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography* published twenty-six articles on ships' passenger lists. Tepper's lists of over 6,000 emigrants are taken from these articles. Unlike Strassburger and Hinke's collection, those listed are not limited to German emigrants. Articles excerpted include "Expeditions to New Sweden," "A Partial List of the Families Who Arrived at Philadelphia Between 1682 and 1687," "Welsh Emigration to Pennsylvania," "Moravian Immigration to Pennsylvania 1734-1765," and "Servants and Apprentices ... 1745." The consolidation of these lists into one composite indexed list provides easy access to an emigration source of great value.

Information provided includes the servant's name, if available; the master's name, county and state of residence and occupation; the date of the newspaper; descriptive information on the servant including ethnicity, age, occupation, other information and type of contract. Additional information can be obtained by checking the actual ad in the newspaper. For example, "Run away ... on Sunday, the 17th of March 1793, a Dutch Servant Man, named Francis Dunne, by trade a tallow-chandler and soap-boiler, about twenty-five years of age, five feet four inches high, of fair complexion, straight darkish hair, can speak broken English, ... talk Low Dutch, ... good scholar in German ... can write some English; and pretends to be some sort of a preacher; he arrived at Philadelphia on the 9th of September 1792 in the Ship Columbia from Amsterdam ... it is expected that he went off in company with three other German servant men, viz Andrew Bartal, Philip Bartal (continued on page 43)

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and Joseph Miller...." The geographic distribution of the masters' towns range from 2 for Anson Co., NC, to 996 for Chester Co., PA. Many Virginia counties including Augusta, Orange, Bedford, and Berkley; West Jersey; Massachusetts and New Castle, Delaware; as well as numerous Pennsylvania and Maryland references are among those listed. The ethnic distribution includes 546 German and 1,545 undetermined. Not only does the author provide access to a tremendous amount of information on a group that is difficult to trace, but he shows us what is available if we only look outside the courthouse.

The original Bremen passenger lists were destroyed; however, the lost information has been reconstructed using the official passenger lists and manifests at the National Archives. The user should be aware that not all Bremen passengers are included in this work; it includes only those for whom a specific place of origin was listed in the manifest. Only 21% of the German passenger arrivals during the period listed a place of origin; the others simply listed Germany. Thus, approximately 32,000 immigrants, those who identified Bremen as their port of origin are included. The alphabetical list provides name, age, place of origin, date of arrival and the name of the ship. Family members are listed together allowing for easy identification of family groups. While this is the final volume in this series, lists for other ports of entry are planned. Researchers of German immigrants are, I am sure, grateful for Ms. Wolfert's continuation of this series following the untimely death of Gary Zimmerman.

Workers of the Writers' Program of the Work Projects Administration in the State of Virginia, *Virginia: A Guide to the Old Dominion* (1940, reprint 1992) xiv, 710 pp.; illus.; maps; acid-free paper; index; \$35.00 + \$1.50 postage. First published in 1940 as a volume in the American Guide Series by the Oxford University Press, *Virginia: A Guide to the Old Dominion* offers a nostalgic journey through a Virginia that no longer exists. One that the researcher tries to recapture in his searches through courthouse documents and printed volumes. A search that the workers of the writer's project made half-a-century ago when they prepared the guide. For those of us who want to see Virginia as our ancestors saw it perhaps the most interesting part of this volume are the tours. In 1940 Route 15 below Gordonsville was described: the forest closes about the route; farms are to be seen only occasionally. Contrasts between past and present occur often: the courthouse at Orange then painted grey is now cream, Greenfields, a brick home with white columns well back from the highway in a grove of trees is now a subdivision and now urban Falls Church was a pleasant suburban community with comfortable-looking homes and well-kept grounds. In addition to the tours with their interesting historical notes, there are chapters on Indians, Negroes, transportation, agriculture, education, newspapers, art, literature, the theater, architecture. The fifteen major cities each have their own chapter which includes a short history and a list of their major attractions. Over one hundred photographs depict attractions or events. But it is the tours which comprise the major portion of the book and which allow one to complete a nostalgic journey into the past, whether it is one's own or one's ancestors and which invite a repetition even today.

In 1985 Netti Schriener-Yantis began the publication of Genealogical Books in Print in order to provide a vehicle for the small genealogical publisher to advertise his wares and for the consumer to find them. Volume 1 was one of my first genealogical publication purchases. I have never regretted it. In no other single place can a genealogical researcher find as comprehensive a list of publications. Finding, as most of us do, that a single project can soon envelope all of our time, Netti has turned publication over to her son (continued on page 44)

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and his wife in order to pursue her other interests. They have followed admirably in her footsteps and their first issue, Volume 5, lists the publications of over 240 vendors. In addition to general reference works, regional and specific localities, there is over 140 pages of family genealogies and newsletters. This is, as are the other volumes, one that any serious researcher must have.

Mr. Skinner continues his abstracts of the probate records of the Prerogative Court of Maryland prior to 1777. The inventories and accounts was a separate series of probate records established in 1674 and continued until 1718 when it was split into two separate groups. Both series continued until 1777 when the Prerogative Court was abolished. The inventories have been published in a series of 17 volumes and Mr. Skinner continues with the earlier inventories and accounts. The abstracts presented in this volume include the name(s) of the appraiser, creditor, next of kin, executor/administrator, debtor, servant and any other persons mentioned. The abstracts of the administrations include the name(s) of the sureties, additional debtors, legatees, persons paid to, distributees and executors/administrators. In addition, some wills for Anne Arundel County appear in this volume. This series of abstracts are of inestimable value to the researcher for they allow access to one of the major bodies of research data available for proving relationships especially of women.

Mr. Wardell continues his abstraction of data from over 2600 reels of microfilm. The information found in these abstracts is taken from the extant bounty land warrants, pension files and correspondence in the pension files. While there is a great deal of variance in the

information found in individual files, one usually finds places of residence, spouses (often with maiden names) and dates and places of marriage. Children, sometimes with birthdates, are occasionally found. In some cases siblings and parents are listed. These files, taken as a whole, offer the largest body of information available on the migration patterns of our ancestors and the individual files provide insight into families that are available nowhere else. Men who entered the service from Virginia or who were born, married or lived at one time in Virginia or who had family members who resided in Virginia are listed alphabetically. The full-name index includes all other names. Women are indexed by both married and maiden name if known.

Few colonial marriages, births or deaths were recorded; fewer survive. Consequently, any source of information is welcome. Although most researchers are aware of the existence of Hinshaw's compilation of Quaker records and the detailed information to be found there, gaining access to a copy is often difficult. The Virginia State Library's sole copy is kept at the Archives desk and researchers use it only under the archivist's watchful eye.

Some Virginia meetings were not considered a part of the Virginia Yearly Meeting and will be found elsewhere; those west of the Blue Ridge and those immediately south of the Potomac River were part of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting. Those in the southwestern part of the state belonged to the North Carolina Yearly Meeting. The Virginia Meeting included Chuckatuck-Nansemond, Western Branch-Lower, Black Water also called Surry, Upper (Gravelly Run-Burleigh), Curles-Henrico, Cedar Creek also called Caroline, Camp Creek, South River and Goose Creek (Bedford Co.), Hopewell also called Opeckan, Fairfax, Crooked Run, Goose Creek (Loudoun Co.) and Alexandria. Many of these areas have lost most or all of their early records. The reprinting of the Virginia volume of the *Encyclopedia of Quaker Genealogy*, has been long (continued on page 45)

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awaited and will be gratefully received by Virginia researchers.

The Northern Neck Proprietary land grants were not issued by the Commonwealth of Virginia until after the death of Lord Fairfax. And, although these records were acquired by the Virginia Land Office, they have always been kept separate. With the completion of Volumes III and IV Gertrude Gray has completed her abstracts of these records. The major portion of the grants found in these two volumes are for land in Culpeper, Madison, Loudoun, Frederick, Shenandoah, Hampshire, Hardy and Berkeley Counties. Because of the controversy following Lord Fairfax's death many of these grants were issued for land that had been surveyed years earlier and contain a great deal of interesting information. For example, the grant issued to Jeremiah Strother of Culpeper County in 1779 was for land that had been surveyed in 1752 for William Rumsey and assigned to Benjamin Morgan who assigned it to John Strother, deceased. Jeremiah was his son and heir-at-law; Ann Strother, widow of John, received her thirds for life. Information in the abstracts include the grant book and page number, name of grantee, place of residence until Virginia began issuing grants, number of acres, location, adjoining landowners, and sometimes the warrant number with issue date and survey date. All names have been abstracted and as indicated in the example above much additional information is sometimes found.

Virginia Marriages: Early to 1800 needs some work. There are obvious errors in the data: Griffith Garten's

marriage to Hanna Miller in Greenbrier County was not in 1707 but 1787, Elijah Garten didn't marry Barbara Bold; she was Barbara Boid and the marriage took place in Rockingham County in 1782, not 1682. But, these are errors that one encounters in printed material as well where we've already learned to check the original or, at least, we know we should. The information is limited to the name of the bride and groom and the date and county of marriage; however, it is a statewide compilation. We can in one or perhaps two screens see and print out (using the DOS Print Screen command) a list of all the Withrow marriages in the state—male and female. It's a beginning.

The names are listed in alpha-order and one can scroll through the list using the arrow and page-up and -down keys or type in a specific name at the prompt. Machine requirements are minimal. The program will work from a single 3½ floppy drive; no hard disk is required. VisonView, a simple proprietary program is necessary to access the data and is shipped free with the data disks. Although the data is not up to the standards we have come to expect from AGL, it is not their data; they are expanding their offerings by adding material supplied by other authors. And, as we noted earlier, any information source should be suspect until it is verified against the original.

Surname, given name(s), county, locale, supervisor's district and enumerator's district are provided. With this information the user can go to the original entry on microfilm. The data found on the microfilm will include the house and family number from the 1890 population schedule (destroyed); names of surviving soldiers, sailors, marines, and widows, rank, company, name of regiment or vessel, date of enlistment, date of discharge, length of service, postoffice address, disability incurred and remarks. Data can be printed using the DOS Print Screen function. VisonView, a simple proprietary program, is necessary to access the data and is shipped free with the data disks.


