FRAKTUR FORUM

SCHALLENBERGER / SCHOLLENBERGER on Fraktur

Marilyn Vineyard asked about the name SCHALLENBERGER on fraktur. Numerous examples are known – too many to list in *Der Kurier*. I sent Marilyn information from nearly forty examples, including those with variant spellings. Although I found none of Marilyn's direct ancestors, some of the data may help her with collateral lines.

A group of fraktur-related family papers that mention SCHOLLENBERGERS were recently sold. Invariably, such papers become scattered, so before they do, information from some of them is provided here. A Bible record in this group says that Carl FAUST and Sophia SCHOLLENBERGER were married on February 20, 1845 by Justice of the Peace, Israel DERR. They were married in Hamburg, Berks County, Pennsylvania. Carl FAUST was born January 19, 1821 in Bern Township, Berks County. He was the son of Ludwig and Maria (GSCHWIND) FAUST. Carl died February 2, 1904. Sophia FAUST was the daughter of Peter and Elisabetha (IBENS) SCHOLLENBERGER. Sophia was born January 5, 1821 in Windsor Township, Berks County. She died March 25, 1902. Elisabetha IBENS's maiden name is listed as EVANS in the next notation, which says Elisabetha was born January 19, 1799 in Hamburg. No other information is given about Peter.

Carl and Sophia (SCHOLLENBERGER) FAUST had a son on September 20, 1845. This baby died the following day. They then had a daughter almost exactly one year later on September 19, 1846. This daughter died at three weeks old. Their third child was Louis Charles, born April 9, 1848. Valentin Peter was born October 30, 1850. Andora Rebecca was born November 19, 1853. Franklin Augustus was born July 10, 1856. Lizia Enorin was born February 10, 1859. And Charles Ellsworth was born September 15, 1861. All these children were born in Hamburg.

Lizia Enorin's taufschein (birth and baptism certificate) survived as part of this group. It lists her father as Charles FOUST. It says she was baptized May 30, 1859 by Pastor EBERMAN. Her parents were sponsors. Among other papers in the group were taufscheins, marriage records, confirmation certificates, and copies of obituaries. They mention surnames of FAUST, ADAMS, SCHOLLENBERGER, LINDENMUTH, REBER, and more. While genealogists regret seeing family papers scattered, there is a bright side. For the brief time such papers appear on the market, they can be recorded so that information on them can be shared with others.

HAMBURG EMIGRATION LISTS

Between the years 1850 and 1934 more than 5 million people emigrated to the United States from the German port of Hamburg. Among major German emigration ports, Hamburg alone has succeeded in preserving complete passenger lists from this period. Now, the "LinkToYourRoots" project, a partnership between the public and private sectors in Germany, is making this information available for free on the Internet.

Emigration through Hamburg was actively promoted by HAPAG, the Hamburg-America shipping line. Agents of the company traveled through Germany and Eastern Europe, telling enticing stories of life in America. Hamburg was a principal port of departure for emigrants from Eastern Europe, including approximately 1 million Jews fleeing persecution.

Information for the years 1890-1892 is already online and can be accessed via a search function. Information returned typically includes vital genealogical data such as the emigrant's age, village of origin, and whether traveling with family members

Additional years will be added on a regular basis starting with the period 1890-1914. Subsequently the entire period 1850-1934 will be made available. Several high-tech companies provided software and hardware for the project, and 25 handicapped employees funded by the State Welfare Office are entering the data.

Emigration Tours of Hamburg. The City of Hamburg hopes that "LinkToYourRoots" will increase the City's visibility and promote tourism. *Hamburger Studienfahrten* (Hamburg Study Tours) offers a four-day emigration tour that includes visits to emigration sites in Hamburg, a boat tour down the Elbe River to Cuxhaven, where a historic emigration passenger hall has been preserved, and an excursion to the fabled town of Lübeck, the "Queen of the Hanseatic League." A one-day tour limited to emigration sites within Hamburg is also offered.

From this page, you can go to various related sites with a click of the mouse. An interesting feature is an online exhibition of historical photos and artifacts, such as the posters used by HAPAG to recruit customers. Further information about the emigration tours of Hamburg is available online as is the search engine mentioned above. A word of caution: Unlike many search engines, this one is case sensitive, so be sure to enter capital and lower case letters in the correct way. Ignore umlauts when entering names on the English version of the page. For instance, enter "Müller" as "Muller."

For those who do not have it at home, Internet access can be gained at many public libraries.

FREEDMAN'S BANK ACCOUNT RECORDS

Freedman's Savings and Trust Company was established in 1865 to serve the needs of Black soldiers. In a few cities, however, the Bank became the bank for the military, and more than five hundred accounts were opened by immigrants from German-speaking areas of Europe. Genealogical information from bank records will be published from time to time in *Der Kurier*. For further details, see the article in the December 1999 issue (Vol 17, No 4) of *Der Kurier*.

All cited records are taken from *Registers of Signatures of Depositors in Branches of the Freedman's Saving and Trust Co., 1865-1874* (National Archives microfilm publication M816), Records of the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, RG 101, National Archives and Record Administration, Washington, DC. A question mark ("?) indicates that the compiler had difficulty reading the handwriting.

Researching Your Female Ancestors ---

Few genealogists can trace their matrilineal line very far back – that's the line from your mother to her mother's mother and so on. It is difficult research because the surnames change with each generation and fewer records about females exist.

However, one woman – Susanne "Sam" Behling – decided to do something about this problem. She started a "Notable Women Ancestors" Web site and a newsletter where she gathers and publishes biographical and genealogical information on female ancestors.

"All women are notable," Behling says. "There are thousands of women whose roles in history have often been overlooked ... There are an even greater number of women who, while possibly not contributing anything historically significant, nonetheless managed to lead very interesting lives."

The Notable Women Ancestors Web site is located at: <http://www.rootsweb.com/~nwa/> It has a large and growing database. The majority of the pages at this site have been contributed by descendants or relatives of the women. The categories are: adventurers, African Americans, artists, authors, educators, feisty women, firsts, great mothers, aunts and grandmas, health care /

humanitarian, heroines, humorous, Native Americans, notorious, pioneers and emigrants, politicians, political wives and suffragists, religious leaders, royalty, survivors and witches. There is a place where you can add information about your ancestress.

"Notable Women Ancestors," the quarterly newsletter, is available by annual subscription from the editor, 2500 N.E. McWilliams Rd., #D8, Bremerton, WA 98311. "Let it be us, then, the family historians and record-keepers of this generation, to uncover the long-hidden stories our female ancestors are waiting to tell and to share them with our families, other genealogists, teachers and historians," Behling says.

What could be a more fitting tribute to our mothers and grandmothers than preserving and sharing information about them and their lives?

VIRGINIA CARROLLS AND THEIR NEIGHBORS, 1618-1800s

by Elizabeth Carroll Foster

Although Virginia Carrolls and Their Neighbors focuses on the Carroll family of Irish origin, this book also provides a glimpse of early Virginia. Rather than a narrative, this book is organized with lists or series of facts that aid readers having Virginian Carroll family ancestry. According to the author, associated names mentioned in this book make it worthwhile for researchers to investigate other ancestral names in colonial Virginia. Most names in the book, however, appear to be of British and Irish origin.

This book is well-indexed with an everyname index, a ship index, a locations index, and a subject index. It also has a fairly comprehensive bibliography.

History of Cecil County Maryland by George Johnston

This book is a comprehensive look at the early history (from the earliest European settlers through the 1830's) of the prominent families of Cecil County Maryland, southern Chester County Pennsylvania, and parts of Delaware. Nearly half the book deals with the area during the 17th Century, a period of time often overlooked or mentioned only briefly in modern histories. The early conflicts

between the Dutch in Delaware and New York and the English in Maryland and Pennsylvania are discussed at length. To a lesser degree the role of the local Native American tribes in these and other conflicts is also discussed. As with most books of this period the poor, who made up the majority of the population, are seldom mentioned. As is common for books of this period, Mr. Johnston's documentation of sources is included in the text when it is mentioned at all. It is usually limited to citations such as "a document found in the Maryland Hall of Records," "a letter from the Philadelphia Historical Society."

Descendents of the early prominent families of the area should find this book invaluable. Unfortunately the "full name index" is very incomplete and, therefore, is basically useless for genealogical researchers. Only a fraction of the names in the book are cited in the index and then with only one or two page references, in spite of the fact that many of the names appear repeatedly in the book. The subject index also does not do justice to the scope of topics covered in the book.

For those genealogical researchers with Brooklyn ancestors here is help. The difficulty of viewing the often faded, blurred, blotched microfilm is relieved by this volume containing transcribed abstracts of marriage and obituary notices.

The book is separated into three parts:

- (1) The person's full name is listed in the obituaries section. Other information such as age, names of children, cemetery location, cause of death, etc. is often found.
- (2) The marriage section contains only the surnames, the groom first, followed by the bride, then subsequently the date of the event followed by the volume and number of the particular newspaper containing the original that was abstracted.
- (3) The obituary index and marriage index section carry the reverend's name, place of residence of bride and groom and the date, volume, and number of the newspaper, arranged sequentially with the names in alphabetical order within the chronological entry.

There is a variety of good genealogical information to be found in these abstracts.

The German author read the well-known newspaper, *Ostfriesische Nachrichten*, from cover to cover for the years 1882 to 1901 to compile the names of 4,200 deceased individuals. Personal data, such as birth, death, places, etc. are shown, along with names of 3,700 relatives of the deceased. Aids for the reader include a section on signs, abbreviations, and definitions used in the book. If the principle entry is in German,

there is a comparative illustration in German and English for reference. Dates of baptism and marriage, anniversaries celebrated, parents and children's names, and cause of death are shown. There are occasional stories about emigration from the northern coast of Germany and settlement in the United States. These stories were copied in the original German version.

Reviewing this book was like reading a hometown newspaper because the German surnames were so familiar to me. The information is listed by death date and the layout is easy to follow. Death places include IL, IA, KS, MN, MO, NE, SD and other states. Birthplaces of children include Africa and the Netherlands, so new ideas may be gained by the researcher about emigration routes. It took very little time to check all the pages for surnames of interest, but an all-name Index would make it easier to find all family names, including relatives of the deceased. Volumes for future years, 1902-1971, will follow.

The compiler states that "when the death register began in the 1850's, there were 32 practicing physicians in Caroline County. Distances and traveling by horse and buggy on bad roads accounted for the need for such a large number."

The "Act for Registration of Deaths, Marriages and Births passed April 11, 1853" required localities to keep birth, marriage and death records. The author has grouped Caroline Co. Death Register records by year. Records are formatted to include: "Name of deceased; race; owner of slave where listed;

sex; date of death; place of death if other than Caroline Co.; cause of death; age at death; name of parents; occupation if listed; place of birth if listed; name of person reporting death and their relationship to the deceased." Birth and death locations are listed if they occurred outside Caroline Co. Post offices within Caroline County in addition to farm and plantation names are included in some entries.

An alphabetical list of "Diseases And Causes of Death," a chronological list of "Commissioners of Revenue For Caroline Co. Appointed To Record Vital Statistics As Reported In The Death Register" and a surname index add to the value of this book. In many cases the author has "consulted other sources, such as marriage records, census records, county histories, family histories and other sources to get a clue as to what the names and dates could be, then returned to the original record."

The author states, "The fact that I have studied the history and records of Caroline County my entire life also helped in figuring out the data." He further cautions the researcher to double-check the information against the original record as well as their own family data. This is Mr. Collins' 5th book on Caroline County death records, with two more to follow. His hard work is appreciated, and we look forward to his future publications.

This book is a tremendous help to researchers whose ancestors died in Pendleton County, West Virginia, from 1788 to 1866. Appraisals of personal property,

such as clothing, household goods, tools – even slaves – are present. Inventories are included, and abstracts of wills are very complete. Author Rick Toothman was especially careful to include names of books included in inventories, and tools relating to trades. In addition, many will abstracts show clear family relationships. Toothman notes that he double-underlined signatures written in German. German names too numerous to mention are included. This book is a must for researchers whose German ancestors settled in Pendleton County prior to the Civil War.

Author Robert L. Pemberton begins his history of Pleasants County, West Virginia, with a thorough description of this region's topography along the Ohio River. Early history of the area centers on disputes between the French and English over the Ohio River. Toward the end of the eighteenth century, as claims became resolved, it became safer to move into the region. But migration into Pleasants County began in earnest about 1800. The County began filling up with what can be described as a melting pot of people of all backgrounds and heritage, including German, French, British, Scots-Irish, and more. One early settler was Christian Schultz (1774-1830) from New York. Pemberton speculates he was Dutch and describes his life as a recluse in the early history of the area.

Pleasants County was formed in 1851 when West Virginia was still part of Virginia. The state of West Virginia was not formed until 1862, during the Civil War. Pemberton's

history is well-written. He describes oil booms and industrial enterprises in the County, and ends his history with a chapter on the older families of the County, giving brief histories of families having names such as Larue, Wagner (a Pennsylvania German family that came to Pleasants County in 1820), Harness, Pethtel (from Germany through Greene County, Pennsylvania), Cochran, Kester (from Maryland), Carroll (from Maryland), Triplett, Smith, Cole, Stout, Lamp, Ruttencutter, Seckman (from Berks County, Pennsylvania), and more.

This book is worth reading for those interested in migration to West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, and other points west.

Annette Burgert, a MAGS member, has done it again, producing another thoroughly researched and detailed book on early (17th and 18th Century) Pennsylvania German immigrants. As with many of her previous books, Ms Burgert has used German and Pennsylvania church records, probate records, and emigration/immigration records to identify the place of origin of some early Pennsylvania settlers. In this case all of the immigrants attended the Lutheran Church in Grossgartach, a village near Heilbronn on the Neckar River. Each entry is documented, so that the reader can easily find the entries in the original documents or copies of them. The book not only has an every name index, but a European village index with the present-

day town names and their postal codes as well as an index of ships. In addition to the text there are several maps, photographs, and photocopies of original entries in the church books and other records.

This book not only is of great value to those whose ancestors are documented therein; but also it can serve as a textbook or collection of case studies on how one traces the village of origin for his/her 18th century German immigrant ancestor.

Ingrid Rimland is a descendant of Mennonites who emigrated to Russia in the time of Catherine the Great. In this trilogy of historical novels, she follows the Neufeld and Epps families as they migrate from Germany to the Ukraine in search of freedom of worship and cheap good land. Part of the family subsequently migrates to the United States, and members of the two branches end up fighting on opposite sides in World War II. The novels contain little genealogical material, but they provide an interesting portrayal of Mennonite life in these places at these times.

It should be noted, however, that Ms Rimland is a leader of the new discipline called "Revisionism." She reveres Hitler, denies the Holocaust, and blames the evils of the world on the "Zionists of Wall Street." With this caveat, potential readers may decide for themselves whether these books are worth their time.

STUMPED ROOTS

If you are not familiar with MAGS's Stumped Roots program, you might want to be. MAGS member, Richard Jarvis, wrote that Stumped Roots Chair, Susannah Brooks, has been an "invaluable resource in helping me to trace my German ancestry." Richard has used Stumped Roots services more than once.

Stumped Roots is designed to help researchers who feel they exhausted every resource and have no place to turn. By writing Stumped Roots, Susannah Brooks takes a fresh look at your problem and makes suggestions you might have overlooked. The program is not designed for Susannah to do research for you, but inevitably that happens, at least to some degree. For example, to help Richard Jarvis, Susannah had to familiarize herself with Richard's family (Feldner, Klein, and Hoppmann), which she did through census records, ship passenger lists, and Baltimore City Directories.

In her response to Richard, she walked him through research she conducted. She mentioned what sources she did not examine, but that should be examined. She then suggested areas Richard might investigate based on educated guesses.

Richard followed Susannah's leads. From one, he received copies of German records, which mention his wife's ancestors. Susannah helped him translate these records (not a function of Stumped Roots, but very much appreciated by Richard Jarvis). From another lead, Richard was able to identify specific 17th and 18th century German Parish registers which might yield results concerning the birthplace of one of his ancestors.

MAGS's popular Stumped Roots program has been in place since 1982 when MAGS was founded. Beverly Repass Hoch, one of MAGS's founding members and the current MAGS Historian, started Stumped Roots as an out-reach program that would benefit MAGS members including those who lived in remote areas. The late Mary K. Meyer ran the program for many years, and now it is chaired by Susannah Brooks. You must be a MAGS member to participate in Stumped Roots.
