Wiesbaden Consulate: Fee Book and Invoice Books

This is the fourth in a six-part series describing the records of the U.S. Consular Agency in Wiesbaden, Germany based on work done by Dr. Kenneth W. Heger's students at the University of Maryland's College of Information (the iSchool). The series will provide information on the records' content, their arrangement, and how you may be able to use them to research your family's history.

People value the records of the Department of State's Foreign Service Posts for the wealth of information they contain about American companies and citizens abroad.

When tackling these records, researchers generally turn to tried and true sources for information, with registers of American citizens, miscellaneous records books, and correspondence files being the most popular. As you expand your research,

however, you may want to explore another source, volumes documenting the financial services consulates provided to American citizens and businesses.

Consulates performed a host of services for American citizens. They verified invoices for business and personal goods shipped to the United States, ensured compensation for damaged merchandise, obtained information from local sources for American citizens, certified signatures, and issued passports.

Since they charged a fee for this work, the Department of State established guidelines for consulates to follow and prescribed specific volumes consular staff members were to use to record their actions and the fees they collected.

Using the financial records of the American Consular Agency at Wiesbaden

Even knowing these facts, financial records may seem boring and difficult to use. Do not underestimate them; they can be a fantastic source of information for family historians. They can document when your ancestor was abroad, when he or she visited a Foreign Service post, document the nature of the business, and tell you how much doing that business cost. These are useful details in fleshing out your ancestor's life.

If your ancestor sought assistance from a foreign service post to certify a document from a local official, needed a passport, gave a local person power of attorney, had an estate matter to handle, etc., these volumes may be your only source of information. It is important to note, your ancestor did not have to register at a consulate or correspond with Foreign Service personnel to be documented in these volumes.

As the earlier articles in this series demonstrated, the Consular Agency at Wiesbaden provided services to thousands of American citizens during its existence. In addition to following State Department guidelines on how to conduct business, the user fees the Agency collected provided it with an important source of income.

The State Department intended user fees to reduce costs to the general U.S. Treasury and to justify the continued existence of a small post like Wiesbaden. As a result, the fees the Agency collected provided the primary source of funds to pay for the Agency's rent, supplies, and utilities. For a small post like Wiesbaden, the fees carried extra significance; they constituted part of the agent's salary.¹

These two factors meant that consular agents like Wiesbaden's John Breuer needed to be careful to document their services and the fees they charged to ensure they got paid the money they earned for doing their job and had money to run the Agency. To that end, Breuer kept two kinds of volumes to document the services he provided and the money he collected for performing them. This article discusses the financial records volumes among the Wiesbaden Consular Agency's records, provides examples of how family historians might be able to use them, and information about how to access that information.

THE FINANCIAL RECORDS

There are two different categories of financial records among the Wiesbaden Agency records, consisting of a total of three volumes. One volume is labeled Fee Book; the other two are labeled Invoice Books. Because the two types of volumes often contained very similar information, it will be helpful to start by defining each one.

From a strictly administrative point of view, both categories of records were to contain different information. The Department of State mandated that Fee Books should serve to record fees a foreign service post collected for services provided to American citizens, but it could also include

references to services provided to businesses, such as invoices. The Department intended Invoice Books to have a more limited scope. In these volumes the Foreign Service Post was to record certification of invoices for goods purchased or manufactured within the consular district for export to the United States. As is the case with many records keeping systems, the Foreign Service Posts did not always adhere strictly to the Department’s instructions. This complicates your research.

The volumes’ arrangement is another intimidating factor. In both categories, Foreign Service personnel entered the information in chronological order. There is no index. That often makes it a daunting task to slog through the volumes looking for information. Near the end of this article, there is mention of a useful finding aid to help you in your research.

EXAMPLES OF WHY YOU SHOULD EXAMINE THE FINANCIAL RECORDS

At first glance the records appeared merely to be invoices for companies conducting business in the consular district. Upon closer examination of the records, however, it became clear that many of these entries included invoices of relevance to family historians. Specifically, the Agency provided invoices documenting the shipment of goods and personal items by both American businesses and private citizens. That information will give you a rare glimpse into your ancestor’s life, travels, and possessions.

The Invoice Books, February 12, 1901 – June 29, 1912

Invoice Book entries were large; each numbered page of the invoice book was two physical pages, with the page number on the right page and no number on the left. This was due to the amount of information included for each entry. A standard entry was usually one line and included, from left to right, the date, entry number, name of the exporting firm, the signer of certificate, the consignee, port of entry, the declared goods, the city of the goods' origin, and the declared value of the exports for each entry. At first blush this sort of information might seem unimpressive. Looking closer reveals how exciting these invoices can be. Here are few examples:

- 2 July 1901 Maria Pabst received an invoice to ship her clothing, personal effects and goods from her household in Wiesbaden worth 2000 Marks to Boston.²
- 5 April 1901 Else Baumann received an invoice to ship household goods and personal effects worth 1,200 Marks to Galveston.³
- 25 November 1904 Mrs. Clara Liebermann received an invoice to ship old furniture worth 10,000 Marks to San Francisco.⁴
- 27 September 1906 E.F. Andrews received an invoice to ship wine from Rudesheim worth 484.24 Marks to Washington, DC.⁵

- 27 April 1907 Frederick W. Feldner received an invoice to ship curios and china he bought in Wiesbaden worth 728.60 Marks to Baltimore.⁶
- 23 August 1907 Anna Kunath received an invoice to ship silverware worth 600 marks to Philadelphia.⁷
- 16 September 1908 John J. Donaldson received an invoice to ship porcelain and kitchen utensils from Wiesbaden worth 552.20 Marks to Baltimore.⁸
- 21 July 1909 Caroline Haeseler received an invoice to ship old household goods worth 785.60 Marks to New York City.⁹
- 15 September 1909 Thomas Buckler received an invoice to return an American car worth \$2,500 to Baltimore.¹⁰

Images 1 and 2 show the two parts of page 119 of the Invoice Book, February 1901 – June 1901.

The Fee Book, February 12, 1901 – February 8, 1917

The first 326 pages of the Fee Book contain information similar to the Invoice Books. The information documents old household goods, linens, perfume, musical instruments, etc., that American citizens shipped to the United States. Each entry includes the goods' value and the port of arrival in the United States. The major difference between invoice information in the Fee Book and that in an Invoice Book is the amount of information. There is considerably less information in the Fee Book, resulting in all of the information being contained on a single page.

The Fee Book's greatest value for family historians lies in the volume's final pages. Pages 327-331 contain a long list of services the Agency provided American citizens during World War I. Information from September 1916 provides an excellent example of these pages' value.

- 5 September 1916 Charles L. Gacuer received a pension affidavit.¹¹
- 7 September 1916 Emma Marx received a pension affidavit.¹²
- 13 September 1916 Bertha Wolff paid for an oath of an attending physician in a life insurance matter, an affidavit in the matter, a physician's affidavit, the undertaker's affidavit, power of attorney to Eugene Wolff, and other services.¹³
- 13 September 1916 Otto and Luise Peuser filed emergency passport applications.¹⁴
- 23 September 1916 Carl Semmler filed a patent application.¹⁵

LIST OF NAMES

Realizing the potential value to family historians, the author took the time to survey the three volumes and created an index of interesting and unusual entries. The index will provide you with an abstract of the entry's data and information so you can locate the reference in the original volumes. MAGS will post that index to the Member Only portion of its website in the coming months.

ACCESSING THE RECORDS

The Wiesbaden Consular Agency's financial records are not available on-line. You will need to examine the originals at the National Archives in College Park Maryland (Archives II). Should you chose to examine these volumes the following physical description of them will guide you to the correct volume and better prepare you to handle them. All three volumes are bound on the spine and corners by leather, while the remainder is covered in cardboard. You should be wary of red rot from the leather which will leave a layer of red dust on you.

Examining the records is a two-step process. First, you will need to visit Archives II and request the volumes. To achieve the best results, you should provide the reference archivists with the complete citation, including the National Archives ID numbers (NAID numbers) for each volume. The records are from National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) Record Group 84, Records of Foreign Service Posts of the Department of State, Records of the American Consular Agency at Wiesbaden, Germany. The three volumes are:

- Fee Book, February 12, 1901 – February 8, 1917; Volume 1; NAID 1328628
- Invoice Book, February 12, 1901 – June 26, 1907; Volume 16; NAID 1328643
- Invoice Book, June 26, 1907 – June 29, 1912; Volume 15; NAID 1328642

Note on the volumes' numbers. The information on the volume numbers is correct. The volume number is an artificial number NARA assigned the volumes when NARA moved the records from the National Archives Building in Washington, DC to College Park, Maryland. During that process volumes were not always on the shelf in pristine order; the result was that in some instances the volume numbers do not reflect the chronological content of the volumes.

After you request them, the staff will deliver them to the facility's Textual Research Room. Keep in mind because they are bound volume you will not be able to make electrostatic ("Xerox") copies, nor will you be able to use a flatbed scanner. You may, however, be able to use an overhead scanner available in the Research Room. You may also use a personal digital camera to take pictures.

FUTURE ARTICLES IN THE SERIES

There are two articles remaining in this series. The next one will discuss the Agency's incoming correspondence. The final one will focus on the Agency's outgoing correspondence.

DEUTSCH UNTERRICHTSFORSCHUNG

Multiple sources, one event

Genealogists are lucky to find one source documenting an event; however, prudent researchers will determine if additional sources exist for the same event. This lesson will illustrate the importance of locating multiple sources because one document may prove to be superior in the genealogical information it contains.

The first source located for Caspar Weber’s immigration was the quarterly abstract shown below:¹⁶

On 1 January 1820, passenger lists became required from the “captain or master of a vessel arriving at a port in the United States or in any of its territories from a foreign country.”¹⁷ The law also required that quarterly reports be submitted to the Secretary of State. The requirement for quarterly reports was later repealed in 1874.¹⁸

The quarterly report states that Caspar Weber, male, is a shoemaker who came to the United States from Germany between 1 October and 31 December 1834. This list does not provide specific information on where in Germany Caspar originated. Additionally, this list does not provide the name of the ship, his date of arrival, or whether he traveled alone or with others. Since this list is a summary of all arrivals for the last quarter of 1834, it is not clear which passengers traveled together. If this passenger list was the only source that documented Caspar’s arrival to America, its information would still be important as there are many early

lists that did not survive. However, the diligent researcher follows derivative records back to their source, if still extant.

Luckily, the original passenger list, shown below, survives from which it is likely that the quarterly abstract was taken.¹⁹

This list shows that Caspar Weber is a carpenter rather than a shoemaker. It appears that the quarterly lists' compiler incorrectly noted his occupation when making the summary. Also, rather than citing each of dwelling places, the quarterly abstract listed all passengers as from Germany.

This is unfortunate as researchers need the town of origin for their German immigrants in order to successfully locate them in Germany. Knowing that Caspar Weber's last dwelling place was Wahlen was essential in locating him in German church records.

This passenger list also shows that Casper Weber did not make the journey on the ship *Jupiter* alone. Rather he traveled with seven other individuals, likely all family members. This is crucial information for identifying the right Caspar Weber and his family members. Matching records located in the United States with the passenger list and then with records located in Germany provide information that can be compared and corroborated to ensure all the sources relate to the same Caspar Weber.

In this example, the importance of locating the original from which derivative records are made is clear. Only consulting the quarterly abstract would have resulted in more hours of research to uncover Caspar's place of origin in Germany and would have caused confusion with Caspar's other records which identify him as a furniture dealer rather than a shoemaker. It also would have given the perception that Caspar traveled alone rather than with the likely seven family members that accompanied him on the transatlantic voyage.

Reasonably exhaustive research includes a search for the origins of a derivative record and locating multiple sources for the same event. This example clearly shows the benefits.

Ribbon Cutting for New Genealogy Center in Wytheville, Virginia

More than 70 people gathered on 16 November 2014, at 165 S. 11th St., Wytheville, VA, to celebrate the opening of the Wythe County Genealogical & Historical Association's new Regional Research Center.

Some visitors came from Pennsylvania and North Carolina to join in the celebration.

Several months of remodeling have taken place since the purchase of the Center in mid-August. Although the electrical and plumbing work required professionals, the officers, board members and other volunteers have done most of the additional work. A major contribution of \$250,000 from out-of-state anonymous donors raised the

building fund to a level where, after six years, the organization could afford to make the purchase. The facility contains over 8,000 square feet of library and meeting space, two restrooms plus one handicapped-accessible restroom, and a full kitchen.

Volunteers are available during regular business hours to assist visitors with their research: Mondays and Tuesdays Noon to 5 p.m., and Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.
